

Spoken Tags

- A way of asking the other person to make a comment and so keep the conversation open
- To make a tag, use the first auxiliary
- If the main part of the sentence is positive, the question tag is negative
- If the main part of the sentence is negative, the question tag is positive

Examples

You're going on vacation, <u>aren't you</u>? You wouldn't jump off a cliff, <u>would you</u>?

- · The question tag uses the same verb as the main part of the sentence
- . If the main part of a sentence has an auxiliary verb, form the tag with this verb
- If the main part of the sentence doesn't have an auxiliary verb, the question tag
 uses an appropriate form of 'do'

Examples

They weren't here, were they?
We had eaten too much, hadn't we?
I said that, didn't I?
You don't recognise me, do you?
She eats meat, doesn't she?

The question tag for "I am" is "aren't I?"

Intonation

- If the question tag is a real question we use rising intonation. Our tone of voice rises
- · If we already know the answer we use falling intonation. Our tone of voice falls
